

## Spay and Neuter/Surgery After Care

Your pet has had major surgery and will need to be well cared-for afterwards to help prevent complications. Following the instructions below will help ensure your pet has a safe and comfortable recovery.

- 1. Limit Activity (walks are ok, no jumping, running or rough play). Be careful if you pick up the animal to be mindful of incision
- 2. Keep on a Regular Diet (adjust to bland diet if needed for diarrhea)
- 3. Keep the Incision dry, uncovered. No bath for 2weeks after procedure
- 4. Check Their Incision Twice Daily, if irritated/swollen you can apply small amount of Neosporin as needed to incision
- 5. Dog must wear cone for 7-14 days anytime they are not being monitored to avoid infection, licking or opening of incision
- 6. Separate dogs as needed, force plenty of crate rest
- 7. Call Rescue directly if You Have Concerns

Grogginess and nausea can occur post-surgery. Females may have light vaginal bleeding/discharge this is normal after a spay. If a pregnancy was terminated, dog may seem depressed for a few days to a week, that's due to the hormones. Feed half of meal the same day of surgery to prevent overindulging/vomiting and then back to regular feeding tomorrow. If dog skips meals, this is fine and can last for about 1-3days. Just make sure they are hydrated and urinating.

Some dogs may need pain medication or antibiotics after surgery. If they are not on any medication, but uncomfortable/restless you may use Benadryl to help them sleep. Most dogs are back to normal within 48hrs and need to be forced to rest to avoid post-surgical complications.
